

Homework Policies

Revised homework policies as of February 2, 2009

STUDENTS ARE RESPONSIBLE for all homework that is assigned throughout the year.

It is the **STUDENT'S RESPONSIBILITY** to acquire any missed assignments and materials due to absence or missed classes.

Homework is due at the next meeting of the class unless otherwise noted by the instructor.

Only homework that is completed in an acceptable format will be accepted.

What is Acceptable Format?

Acceptable format means that the homework paper is set up as follows: The heading should be set up as follows:

Your name _____ Assignment _____

Your Class Name _____ Date completed _____

The rest of the assignment must conform to the following requirements:

1. *You will write the original problem on your homework paper.*
2. *You will show all of your work when solving the problems*
3. *Your answer will be clearly marked.*

Examples of acceptable homework:

Joe Smith Page 300 5 to 15 odd
Delta 6 Feb 2, 2009

5. *write the equation of the line given the following information.*

Slope = 3 , y intercept = 6

Ans: $y=3x+6$

7. *Solve the following equation for the given values:*

$$F(x) = 4x - 9 ; 3$$

$$F(3) = 4(3) - 9$$

$$F(3) = 12 - 9$$

$$F(3) = 3$$

Ans: $F(3)=3$

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Unacceptable Homework:

No Name

No Assignment Identification

No Class name

*Homework that does not include the original problem or question will not be accepted.
Homework consisting of just answers with no work to show how the answers were arrived at will not be accepted.*

Examples of **unacceptable** homework:

Joe Smith

5. 69

7. $4x$

9. $2x+5$

11. $y=3x+5$

13. 3

15. $45x + 7y$

This is not acceptable. There is no identification of the assignment, there is no class name or date.

The original problem or question is not written down and the calculations are not included in the answer.

I must see how the answers were calculated.

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
